# **SEND Careers Event**

Gateshead Council's SEND Team have worked collaboratively with Gateshead's Careers Information, Advice & Guidance (IAG) Team to organise a Preparing for Adulthood & Careers event. **The event will be held at the Dryden Centre SOTA building on October 20th 2021, 1:15pm-6:00pm** and will include representatives from Gateshead's Careers Information and Guidance, Working Gateshead and Learning and Skills teams. Local employers and agencies will also be at the event which is aimed at anyone with an EHCP from Year 10 – Year 13 from any specialist school, college or educational placement.

Lee Peacock is the Careers IAG Lead at Gateshead Council and helped organise the event.

"The event aims to help young people and their families start thinking about their next course and the job opportunities that follow", he said. "Parents and carers are welcome to join the event we want to make sure that they also feel happy and well supported when making decisions regarding post-16 options."

## **Independent Travel Training**

Independent Travel Training is about giving young people the skills and confidence to travel safely on public transport, expanding their knowledge of road safety and how to plan journeys. It can open up lots of new opportunities for young people, making them less reliant upon others, supporting



friendships and helping them to explore opportunities for college, training and employment in the future.

Luke Birkbeck is the lead travel trainer for Gateshead Council's Travel Care team.

"To be an independent traveller is a huge life skill for a young person and can open a plethora of new opportunities," says Luke "During the travel training programme a young person will gain confidence in using public transport, personal safety, using timetables and what to do if things go wrong. I will go with the trainee on their journey, giving encouragement and guidance until they develop the skills to travel on their own."

#### Feedback has been overwhelmingly positive.


"I think it is a good experience," says one graduate of the programme. "I went from someone who could barely leave the house himself to someone who could show a bus pass and go anywhere I wanted."

"It was a great experience for our son and has given him a much greater sense of independence," says one parent. "By the end of the summer he was comfortable making his way to school on the bus and has been able to develop those skills on other bus routes since. It was better having someone outside the family working with him on his travel skills and he really liked Luke which helped massively."

## **Learning Disability Annual Health Checks**

People with a learning disability often have poorer physical and mental health than other people. This does not need to be the case. Annual health checks are for adults and young people aged 14 or over with a learning disability. Anyone aged 14 or over who's on their GP's learning disability register can have a free annual health check once a year. Adults and young people aged 14 or over with a learning disability who are on the GP practice learning disability register



## **Keiron's Success Story**

Kieron is 19 years old; he has a diagnosis of Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder (ADHD) and the difficulties associated with this meant that his early education was severely disrupted. It also meant that he was unable to attend school and was home-schooled for two years.

Gateshead Council's SEND Team helped Kieron identify a place at an education provider which helps young people prepare for the world of work. "I enrolled in Year 7, then went to the college", says Kieron. "Until Year 11 I did science,



PE, English Maths and Design Technology. I passed my Maths with a 6 and passed English with a 4, and I passed my Personal Training course and Mechanics. At college I did work related things – I tried construction then got into mechanics. I completed a two year course in about 8 months."

Kieron received help and input from Gateshead Council's Careers Information and Guidance (IAG) Team who helped him identify work-based preferences and opportunities. Kieron has successfully completed his studies and now has a fulltime job which he independently travels to and from. "My dream job is to be a firefighter", says Kieron. "I need to get a lot fitter first, then see where we go."

Keiron is rightfully proud of his achievements after overcoming his difficulties, and has this advice for other young people: "Stick in. You don't realise how many opportunities you have until they're gone."
