The day celebrated the amazing achievements of our interns and shone a spotlight on how the internships are empowering young people with disabilities to pursue their career aspirations.

Gateshead Learning and Skills' Supported Internship programme is a full-time supportive programme designed for 16-24-year-olds with SEND to gain valuable workplace skills through meaningful work experience placements within Gateshead Council. "I have thoroughly enjoyed my work placement at Gateshead Family Hubs," says Kye. "I feel like I am making a positive difference in the lives of children and families. Brad's Footy Podcast

Hi, I'm Brad. I'm 22 years of age and I've created my own podcast.

My podcast is about all North East football teams. I'm a massive Sunderland fan, but the podcast covers Newcastle United, Middlesbrough as well as Sunderland, South Shields and Gateshead – getting various views from different football



fans. My channel used to just focus on Sunderland, but in order to grow the subscribers I decided to change it to more of a broader audience. Now we've got 454 subscribers – it's gone up by about 40 in the last month!

There's me and a small team who run the podcast. I used to record it at Gateshead College where I was

a student at Project Choice. I'm not a student there anymore so I do it from home virtually on Zoom or Stream Yard – I tend to stream now and it connects onto YouTube.

If I had any advice for people it would be don't give up in life and keep going. Practise makes perfect and even if you have special needs and disabilities it still makes you a normal person, you can do anything and achieve anything! If you want to go down the media route I would recommend doing some sort of media course at college. I used to do that at Gateshead College where I did a lot of podcasting, I made and edited a lot of films and edited my own podcasts. It gave me good experience to do podcasts professionally.

Dryden School 'Vision Friendly School' Award

Dryden school recently achieved Vision Friendly School Award – the first school in Gateshead to do so. This underlies our ethos of being totally inclusive and promoting our pupils' independence, learning and communication regardless of their need.

Over a third of our students have some form of VI (Visual Impairment) need which can range from having some impact to students having very little vision and using a cane, and learning braille in school or another form of communication such as Moon symbols. The school environment was



recognised as being well adapted to accommodate VI learners and the curriculum as being appropriately differentiated for their needs to a good standard. We promote communication, for example through

specialist equipment such as Eyegaze where a student can make choices by looking towards the preferred symbol or picture when they cannot tell us verbally and through a multi-sensory approach which benefits not only




these learners but every pupil. We have introduced tangible symbols, on body signing and book bags for multi-sensory impairment.

VI teachers and specialist support assistants from LINT work collaboratively with staff at Dryden as well as outside agencies to promote the best life chances for our pupils with VI needs. Ofsted recently also judged our school to continue to be outstanding, including provision for our VI learners - Elizabeth Johnson (Headteacher)

Eslington School Marathon Day

Eslington Primary School held their annual charity fundraising day in March. This year, the pupils have chosen to raise money for two local charities – Bryson's Animal Shelter and the Gateshead Foodbank. The first event – planned and organised by the school's Student Council – was for a sponsored 'Run a Marathon' day in support of Bryson's. The aim was for the whole school, over their two sites, to run the equivalent of



The children smashed their target, eventually running a combined total 182,670 metres – which is the equivalent of 113.5 miles – raising £94.11 for their chosen charity. Student Council facilitator Ms Richter was delighted with everybody's efforts: "This year, the children wanted to raise money for some good causes which are close to home," she said. "Our target was



to run 42,200m for a marathon and the children ran just under five marathons! It has been an amazing day and I am so proud of the children for their efforts!"

The children are equally as happy, with one saying: "I ran this for my dog who passed away at Christmas. I'm proud as a peacock!" "I feel happy," said a Class 8 pupil. "I could run another one!"
